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Revelation 1-3 The Vision of Jesus and Message to the Seven Churches

Who? Traditionally the Apostle John is considered the author of this book along with the Gospel of John, 1, 2, and 3 John in the New Testament. Some biblical scholars think it is another follower of Jesus also named John.

What? The book describes both the persecution of the Christian churches in the late 1st century and points to the Last Day with visions and prophecy.

When? There is a large consensus that Revelation was written between 95-110 AD during persecutions under the Roman Emperor Domitian.

Where? The island of Patmos in the Mediterranean Sea. It was distributed to churches in Asia Minor.

Why? The book is meant to reveal a message of hope to suffering Christians and ultimate return of Jesus Christ to put all things right.

Terms

Apocalypse: This is the Greek name for Revelation. The word apocalypse is from the Greek word meaning to reveal or disclose. Apocalyptic language or literature uses a kind of code language that is meant to be understood by the persecuted minority to whom it is addressed. Word pictures and symbols are used to communicate both the distress of the time and ultimate hope in God. In addition to Revelation, other examples of apocalyptic literature include the Prophet Daniel, Isaiah 24-27, Ezekiel 38-39, Mark 13, Matthew 24-25, and Luke 21.

Epistle: This is a formal letter that is normally read out loud to a church. A significant portion of the New Testament is comprised of epistles.

Numerology: This is the symbolic use of numbers to convey meaning or esoteric knowledge. Examples include 7 = perfection (i.e., 7 days of creation), 12 = complete (i.e., 12 tribes of Israel, 12 apostles of Jesus), 40 = a long time, or even at time of trial (i.e., 40 days of the Great Flood, 40 days Jesus was in the wilderness).

Notes on Verses

Revelation 1:3 – The Seven Blessings: A blessing is a declaration of favor or grace. It is performative language creating the reality by its being spoken (i.e., in confession the declaration "you are forgiven", in marriage "I do"). There are seven blessings or beatitudes throughout the book at 1:3, 14:13, 16:15, 19:9, 20:6, 22:7, and 22:14.

Revelation 1:4 – The Seven Churches: The seven churches are Ephesus, Smyrna, Pergamum, Thyatira, Sardis, Philadelphia, and Laodicea all along a major roadway in Asia Minor. Since the number seven also symbolizes completeness then the whole Christian Church may also be seen as being addressed.

Revelation 1:10 – The Lord's Day: Sunday is known as the Lord's Day honoring the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Already in the first century this became the primary day when followers of Jesus gathered together to receive "the apostles' teaching and the fellowship...the breaking of bread and the prayers" (Acts 2:42). While Christians may pray without ceasing, morning and evening, day by day, Sunday is always a festival day remembering our future hope of "the resurrection of the body and the life everlasting" (Apostles' Creed).


Revelation 1:20 – The Seven Golden Lampstands, Seven Stars: Several of the symbolical terms in Revelation are defined later in the text. Hence, the seven golden lampstands are the seven churches and the seven stars are the angels assigned to protect each church. The idea of a guardian angel is found in Psalm 91:10-11 and Matthew 18:10 where each "little one" – each child of God - receives divine help.

Revelation 2:6 – The Nicolaitans: A group that ate food sacrificed to idols and practiced sexual immorality (Revelation 2:14-15). They may have been followers of Nicolaus, who according to the church fathers Irenaeus and Clement, was one of the original seven deacons mentioned in Acts 6:5 who later became a false teacher.

Revelation 2:13 – Throne of Satan: This is the adversary, the evil one who opposes God's will. He is represented as the snake that tempted our first parents (Genesis 2 and 3), the prosecutor of just Job, and the tempter of Jesus (Matthew 4). The fallen angels seek to permanently separate human beings from God. Satan's throne probably refers to the numerous pagan shrines in Pergamum and probably specifically the cult of Caesar. The false gods were often seen as demons deceiving human beings (Deuteronomy 32:17, 1 Corinthians 10:20).

Revelation 2:14 – Balaam: He is the biblical prototype of all corrupt teachers and religious compromisers. He encouraged immorality, idolatry, and infidelity against the Lord (Numbers 22-24, 25:1-3, 31:16, 2 Peter 2:15, and Jude 11).

Revelation 2:20 – Jezebel: She was the queen of the northern Kingdom of Israel, champion of the false god Baal, who persecuted the Prophet Elijah and all who followed the LORD. Here this symbolic name is used to indicate a false prophetess deceiving the church at Thyatira.
