Lutheran Bible Study

Is there something unique about studying the Bible from a confessional Lutheran viewpoint? Yes. The gift of the plain sense for us. The Law and Gospel action as the Holy Spirit works in Scripture to convict our sins and blesses us through good news of Jesus for us in His Word. The Bible is the cradle revealing Christ – reading the Bible in the "light of Christ." The opportunity for meditation to be still and receive the unique gift meant for me.

This is different than the Jewish focus on mitzvot/commandments. This is different than the call to submit to Koran (sorry your Bible is distorted – the Islamic teaching of tahrif).

This is different than sister churches – the Roman Catholic magisterium, the Anglican/Methodist Quadrilateral, the mystics lectio divina, the academies deconstructionist tools of historical criticism, the fundamentalist/literalist declarations, etc. Now, in humility and discernment, we can learn from all these various perspectives. Listen humbly.

Nevertheless, there is a distinctively Lutheran way to study Scripture. Come and see on Thursdays from 11AM to Noon or during Sunday School from 9AM to 9:40AM or so. Here any who can gather will consider the plain sense, the Law/Gospel dialectic, Christ as the key to Scripture, and the opportunity to meditate.

Receive the gift of God's Word as often as possible. Claim the gift for your journey.

LUTHERAN CHAPEL CONGREGATIONAL COUNCIL MINUTES **OCTOBER 22, 2023**

Council made decisions and discussed the following:

- Names were suggested for new council members to serve the 2024 2027 term. Current council members will reach out to the individuals.
- A financial report was provided and it was noted that although expenses for the month of September exceeded receipts, Lutheran Chapel is still under budget overall for the year.
- A motion unanimously passed to receive Nick and Izzy Veverka and baby Evvy into membership at Lutheran Chapel.
- Discussion was held regarding the Vision progress. What do we do with the data collected? Meetings need to be scheduled with the groups formed in order to move forward. Planned our work now we have to work our plan!
- The Organist Committee has two candidates with interviews scheduled during the last week of October. Among other qualifications, both candidates have experience playing piano in a Lutheran church. It was suggested to increase compensation for the position if necessary.
- The Property Committee reported that a work day is scheduled for November 11. Vinyl siding for the shed will be purchased and put up by a select group. The chimes are still not working. The amplifier has been sent off for repair.
- A small group of church members met with Crown Hoffman to propose re-landscaping the courtyard. Details will be brought to council once worked out.
- The Clothing Closet Giveaways have been successful. The next one is scheduled for November 4.
- An idea for the Christmas Program to be included in the Cantata was discussed.
- Commitment Sunday is scheduled for November 19. Temple talks will be presented leading up to that

NOVMEBER LOVE OFFERING ~ Crisis Pregnancy Center

Our love offering for November is the Crisis Pregnancy Center. CPC has been in Gaston County since 1986 and has served over 65,000 women, men, and their families. During the 35 years of service, as a result of their ministry, they have seen more than 8,700 babies saved. Their mission is to affirm the value of life by compassionately sharing the gospel of Jesus Christ and providing the following services: pregnancy counseling, abstinence education, limited ultrasounds and various other medical services, adolescent parenting programs, abortion education - procedures, risks and alternatives, post abortion counseling to women, men, and families affected by crisis pregnancy situations, with the hope of changing lives. Each year, more than 300 clients accept Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior of their lives – praise be to God!

In addition, the center provides things such as material assistance for babies (diapers, clothing, blankets), material assistance for moms, (pregnancy tests, maternity clothes, necessities for nursing), car seats for infants provided by Speedway Charities and local fire departments, referrals for adoption to Lifeline and other Christian agencies.

Music Notes

PREGNANCY

OF GASTON COUNTY

Years ago, when we were living in a small town in Arkansas, I joined a community choir. As we were preparing for our Spring Concert, we were introduced to a song in a musical form I had not sung before. It was a rather short phrase that was sung repeatedly and at times a solo line was sung over the repeated phrase. When we got into our concert venue, we were placed around the outer walls to sing this piece. I found it deeply touching as it spoke to my heart and soul while we repeated the simple chant-like music.

Several years later, we were invited to an evening service. It also was in a form I was not familiar with – the contemplative prayers and music of Taizé. That is when I learned that the piece we sang at that Spring Concert so many years earlier was a part of a community's music that was reaching out to the world and bringing people together as this community ministered to people looking for ways to serve God. The music is repetitive, largely in Latin, and allows us to rest in God's words while opening our heart, mind and soul to God. Why in Latin, you ask? The community of Taizé (their history can be read below) is an interdenominational community that serves people from all over the world. What is the one thing that connects all of us verbally as human beings? None of us speak Latin as our every-day language. And in that, they find unity.

This <u>Lent</u> we will be exploring this unique form of contemplative prayer through the music written by the Taizé community. Although Advent is next on the Christian calendar, we want you to have an opportunity to learn and understand in advance about what we will be doing during the Lenten Wednesday evening prayer services. It is our prayer that you will find it uplifting, peaceful and a time of rejuvenation in our Lord.

Taizé History: The Beginning

Everything began in 1940 when, at the age of twenty-five, Brother Roger left Switzerland, the country where he was born, to go and live in France, the country his mother came from. For years he had been ill with tuberculosis, and during that long convalescence he had matured within him the call to create a community.

When the Second World War began, he had the conviction that without wasting time he should come to the assistance of people going through this ordeal, just as his grandmother had done during the First World War. The small village of Taizé, where he settled, was quite close to the demarcation line dividing France in two: it

was well situated for sheltering refugees fleeing the war. Friends from Lyon started giving the address of Taizé to people in need of a place of safety.

In Taizé, thanks to a modest loan, Brother Roger bought a house with outlying buildings that had been uninhabited for years. He asked one of his sisters, Genevieve, to come and help him offer hospitality. Among the refugees they sheltered were Jews. Material resources were limited. There was no running water, so for drinking water they had to go to the village well. Food was simple, mainly soups made from corn flour bought cheaply at the nearby mill. Out of discretion towards those he was sheltering, Brother Roger prayed alone; he often went to sing far from the house, in the woods. So that none of the refugees, Jews or agnostics, would feel ill-at-ease, Genevieve explained to each person that it was better for those who wished to pray to do so alone in their rooms.

Brother Roger's parents, knowing that their son and daughter were in danger, asked a retired French officer who was a friend of the family to watch over them. In the autumn of 1942, he warned them that their activities had been found out and that everyone should leave at once. So until the end of the war, it was in Geneva that Brother Roger lived and it was there that he began a common life with his first brothers. They were able to return to Taizé in 1944.

The First Brothers' Commitment

In 1945, a young lawyer from the region set up an association to take charge of children who had lost their parents in the war. He suggested to the brothers that they welcome a certain number of them in Taizé. A men's community could not receive children. So Brother Roger asked his sister Genevieve to come back to take care of them and become their mother. On Sundays, the brothers also welcomed German prisoners-of-war interned in a camp nearby Taizé.

Gradually other young men came to join the original group, and on Easter Day 1949, there were seven of them who committed themselves together for their whole life in celibacy and to a life together in great simplicity.

In the silence of a long retreat, during the winter of 1952-53, the founder of the community wrote the Rule of Taizé, expressing for his brothers "the essential that makes the common life possible".

The Community Today

Today, the Taizé Community is made up of about hundred brothers, Catholics and from various Protestant backgrounds, coming from around thirty nations. By its very existence, the community is a "parable of community" that wants its life to be a sign of reconciliation between divided Christians and between separated peoples.

The brothers of the community live solely by their work. They do not accept donations. In the same way, they do not accept personal inheritances for themselves; the community gives them to the very poor.

Certain brothers live in some of the disadvantaged places in the world, to be witnesses of peace there, alongside people who are suffering. These small groups of brothers, in Asia, Africa and South America, share the living conditions of the people around them. They strive to be a presence of love among the very poor, street children, prisoners, the dying, and those who are wounded by broken relationships, or who have been abandoned.

Over the years, young adults have been coming to Taizé in ever greater numbers; they come from every continent to take part in weekly meetings. Sisters of Saint Andrew, an international Catholic community founded seven centuries ago, Polish Ursuline Sisters and Sisters of St Vincent de Paul take on some of the tasks involved in welcoming the young people.


Church leaders also come to Taizé. The community has thus welcomed Pope John Paul II, Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew of Constantinople, metropolitans and bishops of different Orthodox Churches, four Archbishops of Canterbury, the fourteen Lutheran bishops of Sweden, and countless pastors from all over the world.

From 1962 on, brothers and young people sent by Taizé went back and forth continually to the countries of Eastern Europe, with great discretion, to visit those who were confined within their frontiers.

Brother Roger died on 16 August 2005, at the age of 90.
