

COUNCIL MINUTES

Financial Report

James Hovis advised that for February 2025 we were \$4000 in the deficit. However, we currently are about \$3000 in the red taking since we were below budget in January. If we go three months in a row in the red, the finance committee will address the congregation.

Pastor's Report

- A memorial gift of \$750 was received from Gary Phillips, the brother of Dillard Phillips, who served leading the Faith Group for decades. The council advised that the donation would be placed in the general fund. A portion of it will go to provide a meal at one of their meetings in memory of Dillard.
- Transfer of membership Dr. Stephen and Debbie Laws have joined First United Methodist Church, Gastonia and Susanne Sowerby has joined City Church.
- Question was asked as to what happens to the grave sites when a person moves their membership?

Old Business

- Church Year Book Susan has made contact with the chairs of each committee for updates and a post has been placed in the newsletter to the congregation to let the office know of any changes in their contact information. Susan hope to get the book ready in April.
- Organ Search Committee Currently there is no activity.

New Business

- Terry Ratchford has taken a temporary leave of absence as finance Chair and Sunday offerings. Ervin Hoffman, Co-Chair will handle in Terry's absence.
- Things are all set up and ready to go with the stock donation to McMahan Financial.
- Music Department There was a meeting with parents to discuss the music program for our youth. There
 has been no consistency in youth attendance. Matt Hoffman suggested that we make it more about learning
 music instead of "performing" in the church. This allows them to understand how to read and follow the music. They can use the instruments we currently have such as the xylophones, hand chimes, etc. and possibly
 have music, a meal, and then open the gym for play.

- Rob Andrews discussed how the Young Life Program works. It reaches out to the youth where they are instead of the youth reaching out to the church.
- Seth advised that his wife Hannah is planning an Easter egg hunt for April 13 at 1:30 pm. They are looking for donations of candy. The daycare kids and their families will be invited.
- Life in Christ Lutheran Mission, formerly the Chosen group has asked that we continue to allow them to use our church to have two events per month. They will contribute \$150 per event to our church. They may move their service from Saturday to Sunday from 2 to 3 pm in the Chapel, followed by bible study from 3 to 4 pm in the fellowship hall. This is being referred to the facilities committee for consideration. Seth suggested that we invite the group to our events and church.

Committee Updates by Council Liaison

- Property Committee Rob Andrews advised that they are putting together a mowing team. They are also
 planning a cleanup date. They currently need approval to put a new roof on the parsonage. The property
 committee will obtain a quote and submit it to the council for approval.
- Evangelism Don Boyette advised that several members have agreed to check the porch to see if there is anything there that can be stolen.

MUSIC NOTES



As Christians around the world celebrate the joy of our Risen Lord, many are participating in The Hallelujah Chorus from George Frederic Handel's Messiah. "But that is a Christmas song" you say. Yes, you are correct. And No, you are not correct. George Frideric Handel's Messiah was originally an Easter offering. It burst onto the stage of Musick Hall in Dublin on April 13, 1742. The audience swelled to a record 700, as ladies had heeded pleas by management to wear dresses "without Hoops" in order to make "Room for more company."

Like many of the great composers, Handel was a child prodigy. He began composing operas at a young age and by his twenties he was the best paid composer on earth with people fighting for seats whenever he performed. However, fame is fleeting and Handel's music soon became old-fashioned. No matter what Handel tried, his compositions failed. Bank-ruptcy and depression followed. Handel had a stroke and developed a palsy that crippled his fingers. It seemed that Handel's career was over. Frederick the Great wrote that "Handel's great days are over, his inspiration is exhausted." Yet the very situations that seemed to destroy Handel changed him and gave his compositions more depth and feeling.

The Inspiration for the Oratorio

Handel's friend and patron Charles Jennens sent him a libretto created from a collection of Bible texts about the life of Christ. The words "Comfort ye, comfort ye my people" from Isaiah 40 inspired Handel. Handel agreed to write the music. He thought it would take a year to complete. However, when a charitable organization from Dublin gave Handel a generous commission to compose a piece for a benefit, he got busy.

On August 22, 1741, Handel started composing music for the texts that Jennens had sent him. Handel was inspired. When he finished less than a month later he had written one of his most famous and successful compositions ever, *The Messiah*.

The men and women in attendance that opening night in April sat mesmerized from the moment the tenor followed the mournful string overture with his piercing opening line: "Comfort ye, comfort ye my people, saith your God." Soloists alternated with wave upon wave of chorus, until, near the midway point, a famous contralto intoned: "He was despised and rejected of men, a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief."


Now, of course, *Messiah* is a fixture of the Christmas season. Woe to the concert hall in the United States or Britain that fails to schedule the piece around the holiday. For many amateur choirs, the work is the heart of their repertoire and the high point of the year. Many communities schedule Messiah sing-alongs which often consist of only the first of the orato-

rio's three parts, with the Hallelujah Chorus (originally concluding the second part) replacing *His Yoke is Easy* in the first part. The three parts consist of:

Part I: The Annunciation

- Scene 1: The prophecy of Salvation Scene 2: The prophecy of the coming of the Messiah Scene 3: Portents to the world at large Scene 4: Prophecy of the Virgin Birth Scene 5: The appearance of the Angel to the shepherds Scene 6: Christ's miracles Part II: The Passion Scene 1: The sacrifice, the scourging and agony on the cross Scene 2: His death, His passing through Hell, and His Resurrection Scene 3: His Ascension Scene 4: God discloses His identity in Heaven Scene 5: The beginning of evangelism Scene 6: The world and its rulers reject the Gospel Scene 7: God's triumph Part III: The Aftermath Scene 1: The promise of redemption from Adam's fall Scene 2: Judgment Day Scene 3: The victory over death and sin
- Scene 4: The glorification of Christ

Much of the libretto comes from the Old Testament. The first section draws heavily from the book of Isaiah, which prophesies the coming of the Messiah. There are few quotations from the Gospels; these are at the end of the first and the beginning of the second sections. They comprise the Angel going to the shepherds in Luke, "Come unto Him" and "His Yoke is Easy" from Matthew, and "Behold the Lamb of God" from John.

Food donations can be brought to church during the month of April or anytime that is convenient for you. Bags can be placed in the blue CAM food box located in the back hallway of our Sunday



Dear Reverend Comer,

Thank you for the gift sent to Samaritan's Purse for U.S. Disaster Relief from Lutheran Chapel Church. We are deeply grateful for your partnership.

Recently I was in California with our teams who are responding in the aftermath of the terrible wildfires there. The destruction is hard to fathom—mile after mile of homes burned to the ground. Our staff and volunteers are coming alongside families to sift through the ashes of what once were their homes to try to find meaningful belongings that survived and to share God's love with them during this very difficult time.

Samaritan's Purse is continuing to help victims of Hurricane Helene, and we have begun the long process of rebuilding houses and replacing mobile homes for hundreds of families in western North Carolina and eastern Tennessee. Our disaster relief personnel are also working in several hard-hit counties in this area to meet immediate needs including emergency shelter, replacing vehicles that were ruined by the floods, and more. We are fixing driveway bridges and culverts for residents to restore access to their homes, and we are providing grants to help churches repair and rebuild. We have been working in Georgia since the storm as well, and have helped over 1,700 families there.

Please pray with us for those who have lost so much and our teams as we work in Jesus' Name. May God bless you.

The April Love Offering is the Lutheran Services Carolinas. It is a faith-based health and human resources organization serving children, families and seniors in the Carolinas. Thousands of people annually are helped through the following services.

Adoption - regular and special needs Adult Residential Services Child and Youth Residential Services Disaster preparedness and response Family and individual counseling Foster care - family, therapeutic and medically fragile Homelessness prevention Refugee and resettlement and immigration Veteran's services



LSC serves in **Gaston County** through foster care, services to people with developmental disabilities, its partnership in Senior TLC program and Dallas High School Apartments.

Lutheran Services is the co-managing director of the Dallas High School Apartments which provides affordable housing for those 62 and older or 55 and older if disabled.

LSC is a founding partner of the Senior TLC Program for All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE) which serves Gaston, Cleveland, and Lincoln counties. PACE is a Medicare program and Medicaid option for North Carolinians who need skilled nursing but wish to stay in their own home.

Mountain Ridge group home in Gastonia provides a safe home for six adults with developmental disabilities.

Lutheran Services Carolinas works in partnership with congregations, governmental agencies, and other human service providers to promote healing and wholeness for the Carolinas' most vulnerable people.

Please consider contributing a love offering to support Lutheran Services Carolinas so that they may continue their ministry and strengthen their outreach to people in need. Thank you!


